

i. Update on the 2022 - 2023 DCPS Budget

Laura Taylor, Director of Business and Finance, presented an update on the current State Budget.

As of Friday, May 20, 2022, the Virginia General Assembly has still not adopted a State Budget for the 2022-2024 Biennium. The most current information we have received is that the General Assembly will meet on June 1 at 10:00 a.m. Once the budget is passed by the General Assembly, the budget must go to the Governor for his action. He has 7 days to act, and either sign it, veto it or make further changes.

We were informed by Mr. Barton, the County Administrator, that in the County's proposed budget, the school division is listed at \$5,221,723 for FY-23. This is the required local match listed in the Senate Budget. The required local match this year is \$478,974 more in local funding than last year's required match. Mr. Barton also stated that the the school division will be allowed to carry over excess funds for FY-22. DCPS requested \$5.9 million local funds from the Board of Supervisors FY-23. It does require the School Board to decrease its budget by \$678,277. We will be working on amending the proposed budget and hope to have a proposed budget to the School Board as soon as possible.

We thank the Board of Supervisors for this information to assist us in the planning process for 2022 - 2023.

j.Discussion of the Proposed 2022 - 2023 Salary Scales for DCPS Full-Time and Part-Time Employees

The 2022 – 2023 proposed salary scale summary for all DCPS employees includes:

- •A 5% increase for all employees plus step increase for a total increase of 7.07%.
- Updating milestones for Teacher BA and Teacher MA scales
- Use of the proposed Compensation-State funds of
 Compensation Supplement Required Local Match:
 Other Operating Funds
 \$168,855
 \$436,602

The approval of the proposed 2022 – 2023 salary scale is contingent on the approval of the State Budget by the General Assembly. Ms. Taylor explained the proposed teacher salary scale and the proposed changes in the amount for steps, in addition to the Part-Time and Substitute Salary Rates.

To allow DCPS staff to begin working on staff contracts as soon as possible, we are requesting that the School Board approve the proposed salary scales contingent on the approval of the State Budget and with no significant changes to the proposed Compensation – State funds and local appropriations. If it appears that there are significant changes in the Compensation State Funds or the local appropriation, we will place this agenda item in the June School Board meeting for the Board's further consideration.

May 25, 2022

It'll be really neat to see those things once they get those things installed and with the happenings of this week in Texas, we all know why that's very important. Our heart goes out to those folks. I enjoyed graduation. I would like to thank Mr. Compton and his staff for the graduation. I thought it was a very nice ceremony and they did a first-class job. I'd like to congratulate our graduates as well. I'm pleased to be able to do the stipends for our employees from the ESSER funds. It's well-deserved they've been through the wringer the last little bit so that was welcome to do. Again I know summer schools getting ready

to start and I appreciate those folks even after they've been to the ringer as we said, we still got folks that are willing to jump back in there. Summer school starts tomorrow so hopefully, they'll have an enjoyable time and then help the students regain some learning loss that they possibly had. For everybody else enjoy the summer you know the students and staff it's well-deserved. I would like to thank the Board of Supervisors for going ahead and making their allocation even without a state budget. That's important and we appreciate that. As you mentioned Rapha and their donation to the Communities in Schools Program. That program has done some really good things and I think this donation will even help us some more.

Damon Rasnick: I think he said about everything that needed to be said. We've all been reminded that everybody associated as parents, teachers, aunts, uncles grandchildren we got another reminder of just how sad things could be. It's also a reminder that I don't care how good we think things are, that we always need to have our guard up and need to have things in place that we've all talked about. We've done a good job in my view. But we need to double-check those things and make sure that we do every single thing we can to not have something happen here that we would all feel sorry about someday. We're not exempt, no school is, no county is in this country or around the world for that matter. There are things that can be done if everybody in the building, everybody on the playground, supervision in the fields and in the gym if every adult there does their job and meets the responsibility you diminish the risk of something like that happening. I know will probably talk to the Superintendent about that but I think we've done a good job with it through the years. Tomorrow is another day and we've got to do that job every single day without fail to serve our children and their families in a good proper way. I'd like to thank the teachers and all the school employees and their families and the parents and the children for the difficulties that we've had these past two years regarding all the schedule changes with Covid and every other challenge that has been out there. I again think it has been handled well by the superintendent and her staff and I think the parents and grandparents and the students have been as cooperative as they can be as well. It's been done in my view to the degree of professionalism and decency that probably excel what we might have anticipated. What I might have anticipated. The challenge will still be there no matter what we face, we just have to be prepared to meet that challenge in a way that is professional, and responsible and that we don't make a mistake in any of this. I hope everyone has everybody has a safe and happy summer.

That is an outstanding achievement that ought to be probably more recognized each year. I thought he did such a humble, respectful job in making that point and how he handled that. It's something that really made me think about all the good things through the years that have happened here in such a good way.

I was so touched by his sincerity and then tonight as I watch his son, another generation, come in effect and make that change and that positive thing in history. I think that's what we're all doing here. I think that's the real key to life.
